# A Smelly Weapon

It's dinnertime and a group of hungry foxes has spotted a tasty treat—a skunk.

The skunk is too slow to outrun its **enemies**.

So it raises its bushy tail and sprays a stinky oil.

Phew! A horrible smell fills the air.

The oil stings the foxes' eyes.

They can't run away fast enough!





A skunk's oil smells awful! Some people say the odor reminds them of burnt rubber or even rotten eggs!

# Under the Tail

All skunks can spray a smelly oil, called musk, when they're in danger.

The musk is stored in two small pouches under the animal's tail.

The pouches hold enough musk for about six sprays.

When the pouches are empty, it takes the skunk a few days to make more musk.







A skunk can spray as far as 15 feet (5 m). The stinky oil can sting enemies' eyes and make them feel sick. The musk is not deadly, but its bad smell can stick around for days!
