

A Surprising Guest

Few things could surprise Juli Lederhaus. As a hotel manager in Salem, Massachusetts, she had met people from all over the United States. Yet she had never seen a guest like the one who came into the lobby one afternoon in August of 2008. This guest was a pig—a real pig.



Salem's latest visitor was no farm animal, though. Instead, she was a family pet. Her name was Olivia, and she was a three-and-a-half-month-old potbellied pig. Olivia and her owners had arrived from Rhode Island for a short vacation. For the next few days, they would stay in the hotel and tour the town together.



Mini-Pigs

Potbellied pigs like Olivia are also called Vietnamese potbellied pigs and **miniature** pet pigs. These longer names tell something about their size and where they came from.

In 1985, a zookeeper in Canada **imported** 16 potbellied pigs from Vietnam. The **offspring** from these pigs were placed in zoos in the United States. Some of the people who saw them thought they would make good pets. Why?


Where Potbellied Pigs Came From



When fully grown, potbellied pigs weigh only from 60 to 175 pounds (27 to 79 kg) and measure about two feet (.6 m) high at the shoulder. A farm pig, however, weighs at least 600 pounds (272 kg) and can be at least three feet (1 m) high. Potbellied pigs are sized more like medium-size dogs than hogs—just the right size for a pet.
