Alien Cats

Unlike other cat **breeds** that got their start hundreds of years ago, Ragdolls were first **bred** in the 1960s. A cat named Josephine, from California, is credited with helping to start the breed.

Where Ragdolls Came From



Josephine lived with her family in Riverside, California.

Some people think that the adult cat in this photo is Josephine. However, most people feel that another cat was used to pose as Josphine.



Josephine's owners noticed that a **litter** of her kittens was different from her earlier ones. Rather than being playful, the kittens were very calm. Their bodies also went **limp**, or flopped, when they were picked up. Ann Baker, a cat breeder, thought they were special. So she bred them, creating the Ragdoll breed. Some people thought Josephine's kittens were different because she had once survived a car accident. They thought the accident had changed Josephine. Baker claimed that the kittens were different because the government had done a **genetic experiment** on Josephine.

Ann Baker also claimed that her Ragdolls represented a **link** between humans and space **aliens**. This is the reason that Ragdolls are often called "alien cats."



Ann Baker bred her Ragdolls to have beautiful, bright blue eyes.

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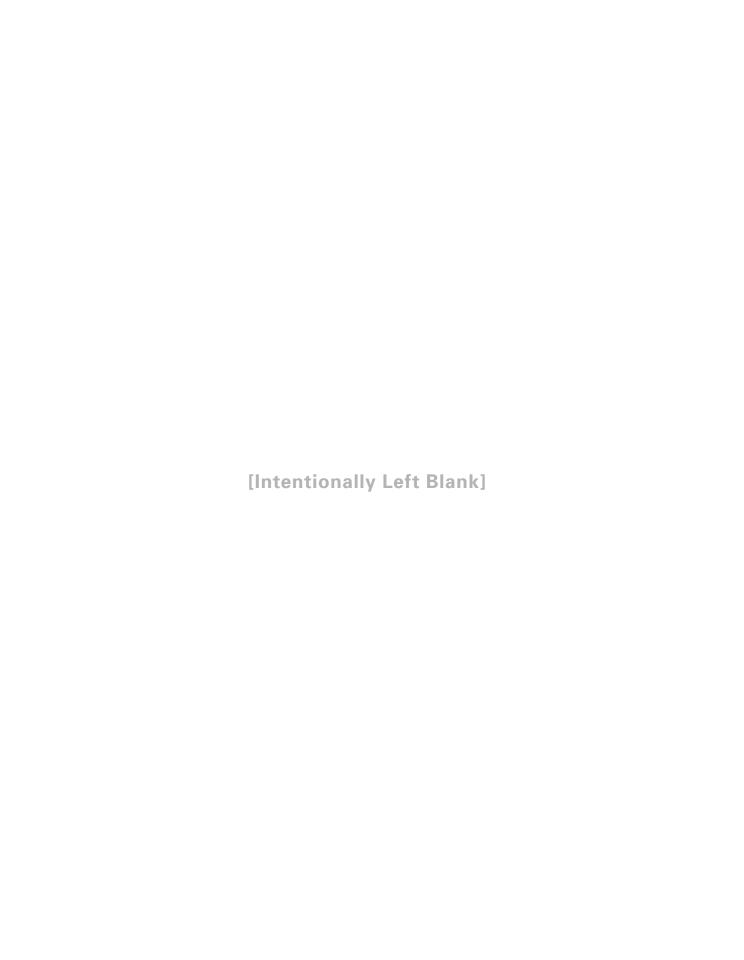
