While reading to Kaila, Hannah felt relaxed, even when she mispronounced a word. She wasn't nervous or embarrassed, as she was with her classmates. When Hannah read aloud to Kaila, the dog's owner, Barbara Babikian, sat with them. She helped Hannah pronounce hard words and explained their meanings. After many months, Hannah was reading faster and with greater confidence. She says, "Kaila helped me a lot. She made reading a lot more fun and easier."
