



As a result, Hannah refused to read aloud in front of her classmates.

Luckily, Hannah soon met someone at school who helped her improve her reading skills. Hannah's partner was Kaila—a Shetland sheepdog! Dogs can't read. So how was the **canine** able to help Hannah?



The Perfect Partner

Kaila the sheepdog helped Hannah read better simply by being a good listener. Every week, Hannah spent 15 minutes in a quiet area of her school reading aloud to Kaila. The dog snuggled with the young girl as she read. Hannah was happy. She remembers thinking, "Wow, someone understands and cares about what I'm reading."

While reading to Kaila, Hannah felt relaxed, even when she mispronounced a word. She wasn't nervous or embarrassed, as she was with her classmates. When Hannah read aloud to Kaila, the dog's owner, Barbara Babikian, sat with them. She helped Hannah pronounce hard words and explained their meanings. After many months, Hannah was reading faster and with greater **confidence**. She says, "Kaila helped me a lot. She made reading a lot more fun and easier."
