White searched for clues in the **abandoned** town. The colonists' boats were missing. Their homes were gone.


Worries filled White's mind. Were the Roanoke **settlers** alive or dead? What happened to them?



Roanoke Island is on the eastern coast of North America, in what is now North Carolina. Roanoke's colonists were originally from England. John White was an artist. He also served as the colony's governor.

England Versus Spain

Why would a group of people from England want to live on a tiny island across the Atlantic Ocean, thousands of miles from home? For Europeans in the 1500s, exploring the world meant a chance to find treasures. They hoped to build colonies and discover **natural resources**—such as gold—that could make them rich.



Both Spain and England wanted to start colonies in new lands. The two countries were **rivals**. By the late 1500s, Spain had many colonies in South America and in the southern part of North America. Leaders in England wanted to compete with Spain. They planned to set up a colony on the eastern coast of North America—on Roanoke Island.
