King-Size Kangaroos

The red kangaroo is the biggest marsupial (mar-SOO-pee-uhl) in the world.

A male red kangaroo can weigh up to 200 pounds (91 kg).



It can stand almost seven feet (2.1 m) tall. That's taller than most people.

Female red kangaroos can weigh up to 88 pounds (40 kg) and stand more than 5 feet (1.5 m) tall. Their fur is usually bluish-gray, not red like a male's.






Red kangaroos live in Australia. They live on hot, dry grasslands. The grasses that grow there are their main food.
