A Fast Falcon

The peregrine (PEH-ruh-grin) falcon is the fastest animal in the world.

It can fly at a speed of 68 miles per hour (109 kph).

Many birds can fly that fast.

However, the falcon can also dive through the air at an even more amazing speed—200 miles per hour (322 kph).

No other animal can do that!

A baseball
pitcher's fastball flies at
a top speed of about 104 miles
per hour (167 kph). The world's
fastest roller coaster travels at a
top speed of 128 miles per hour
(206 kph). A diving peregrine
falcon is faster than
both.







Homes in High Places

Peregrine falcons can be found in many parts of the world.

They usually live in places with steep, rocky cliffs.

There, high above the ground, they make their nests on **ledges**.

From these nesting places, they have a good view of the land spread out below.
