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
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DEATH DREAM

It was the night of April 14, 1912. Alone and dying at a shelter in Kirkcudbright, Scotland, Jessie Sayre, a young **orphan**, tossed and turned in a **feverish** sleep. Captain W. Rex Sowden, the director of the shelter, was called to comfort her. Meanwhile, hundreds of miles away, a huge ship called the *Titanic* cruised in the dark waters of the Atlantic Ocean toward an unseen iceberg.




Yet somehow Jessie sensed the *Titanic*'s **doom**. "Hold my hand, Captain," she cried. "I am so afraid. Can't you see that big ship sinking in the water?" Sowden told her it was only a dream, but Jessie insisted. "Look at all those people who are drowning. Someone called Wally is playing a fiddle and coming toward you." Then Jessie fell into a **coma** and died at 11:40 PM— the same time an iceberg struck the *Titanic*'s **hull**.



BOOK OF DOOM

Jessie Sayre was not the first person to imagine the doomed ship and its passengers. Fourteen years earlier in 1898, Morgan Robertson had written a book about an **ocean liner** that was a **dead ringer** for the *Titanic*. Both ships were around 800 feet (244 m) long and could
