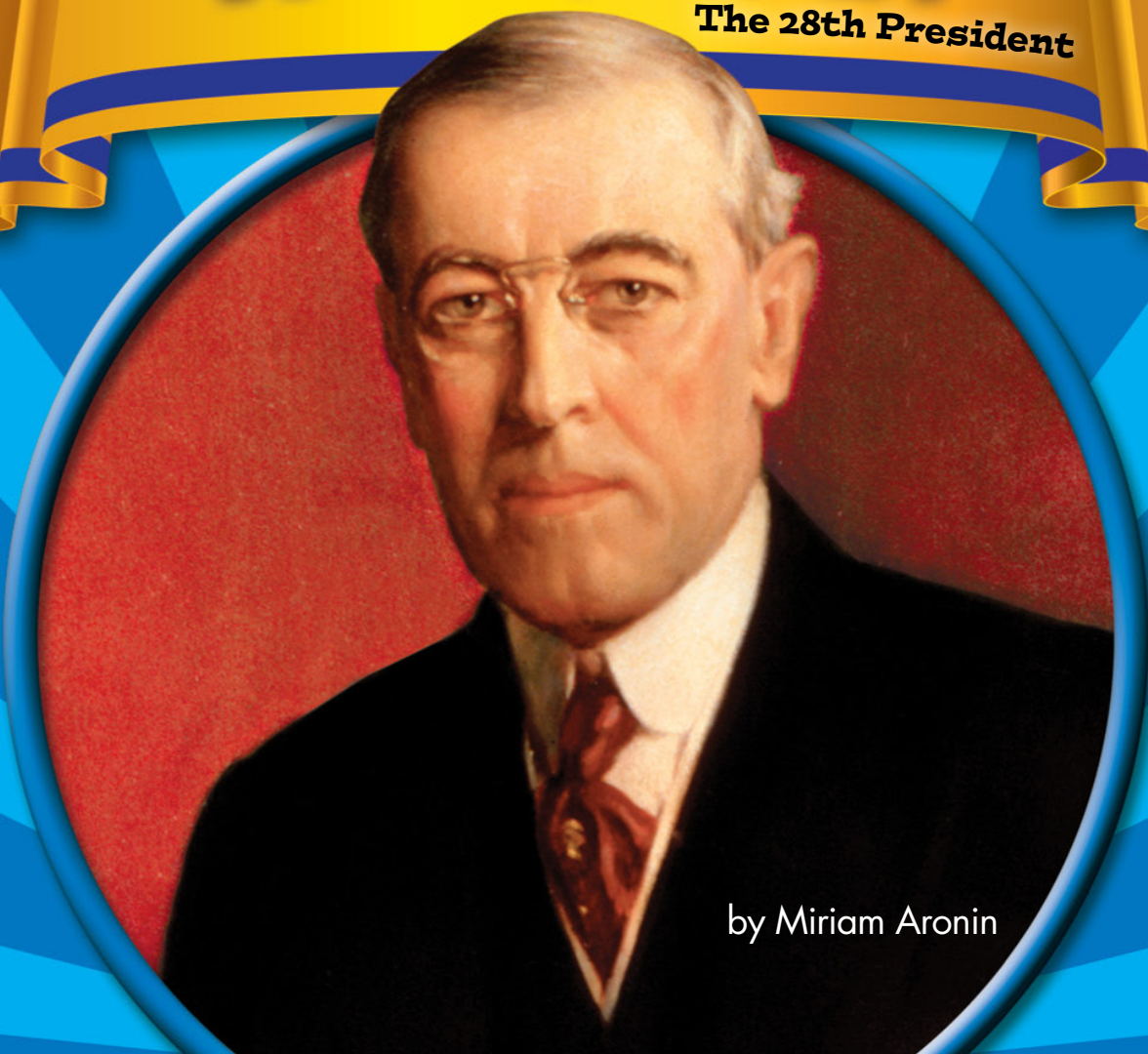

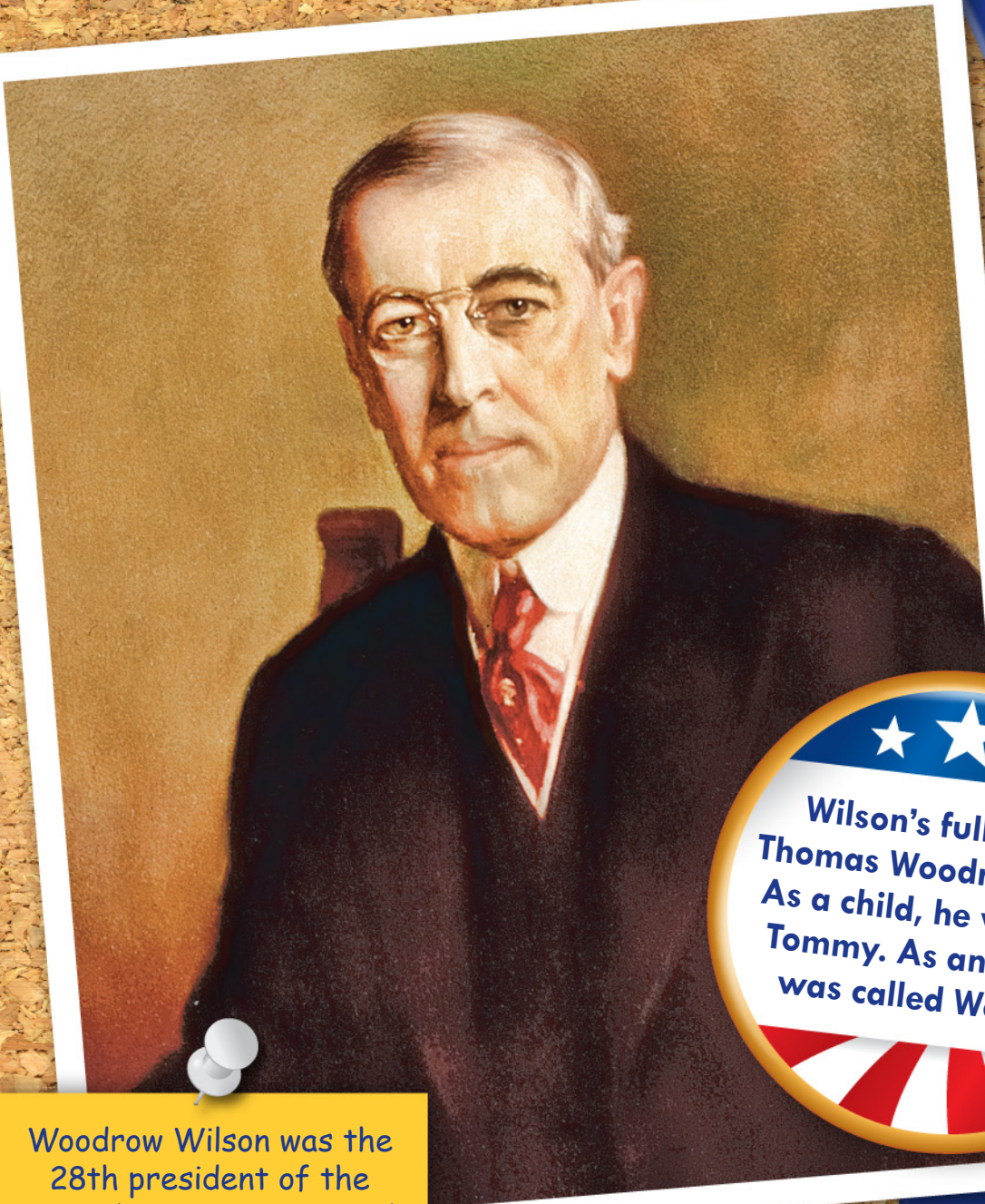

Wilson wanted all people, such as these factory workers, to have safe working conditions.



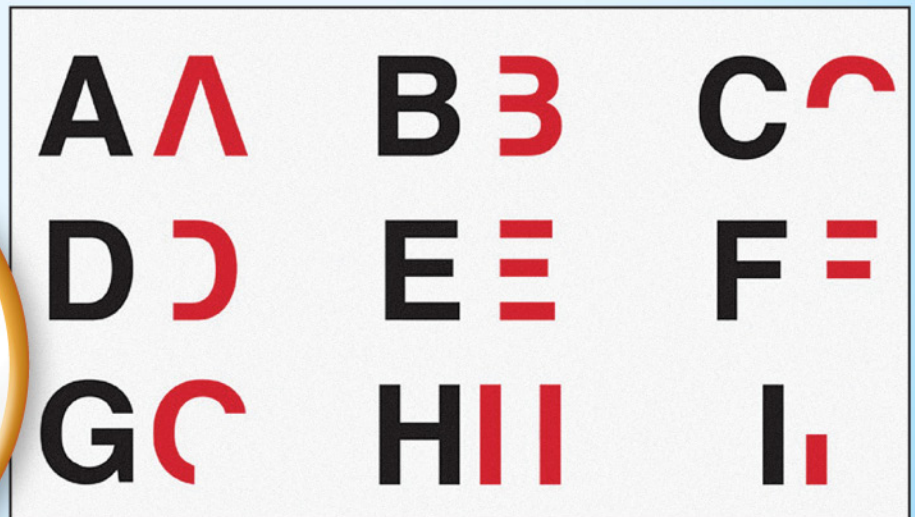
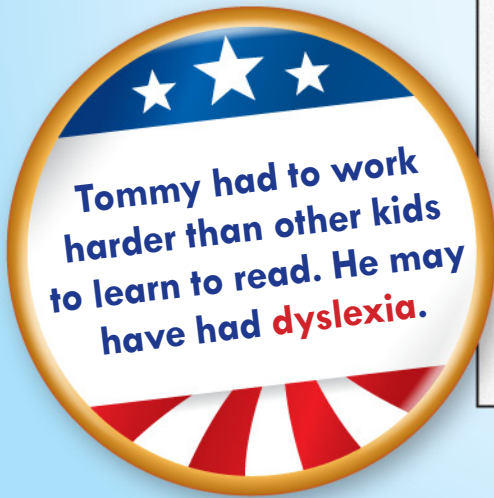


Woodrow Wilson was the 28th president of the United States. He served from 1913 to 1921.
