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
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An Olympic Ride

Going for the Gold

Hoy steadied Darien Powers. They cleared fence 12. The last fence was just steps ahead.

Hoy gripped Darien Powers with his legs. The horse leaped up. His back legs pushed the two of them high into the air. They sailed over fence 13 and raced to finish the course. The Australian team won the gold medal!
