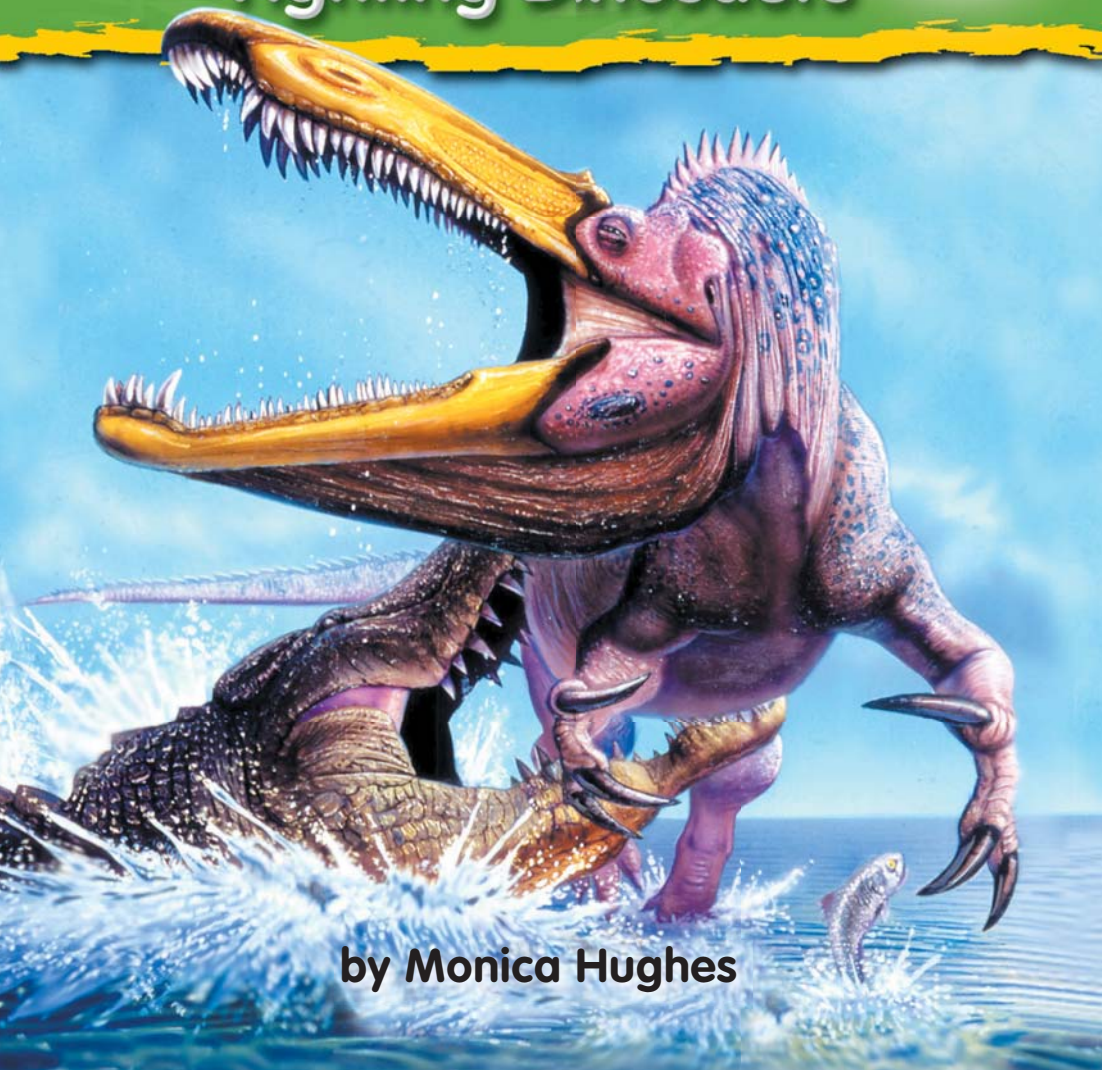

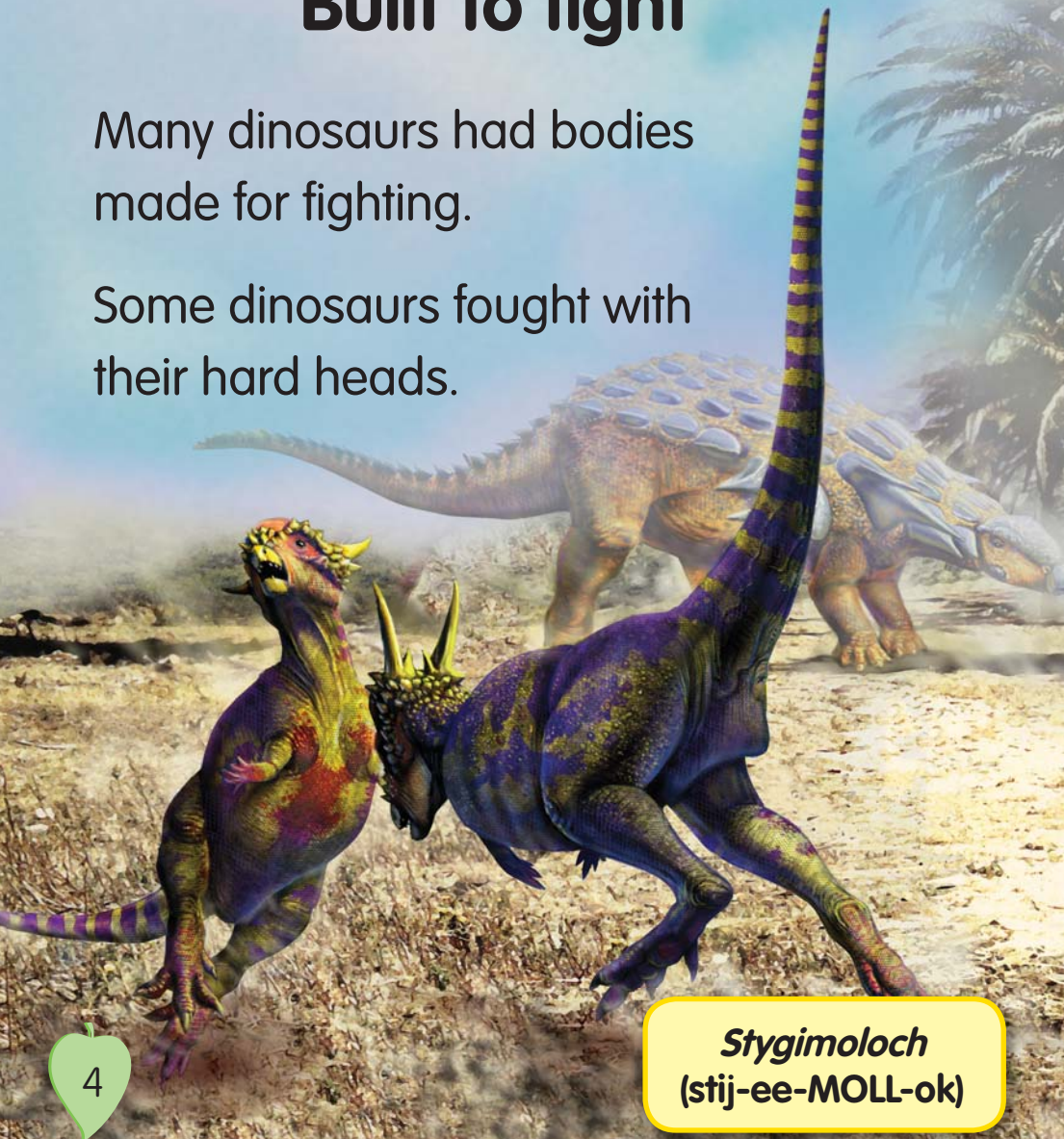

Other dinosaurs used their sharp **claws** in battle.



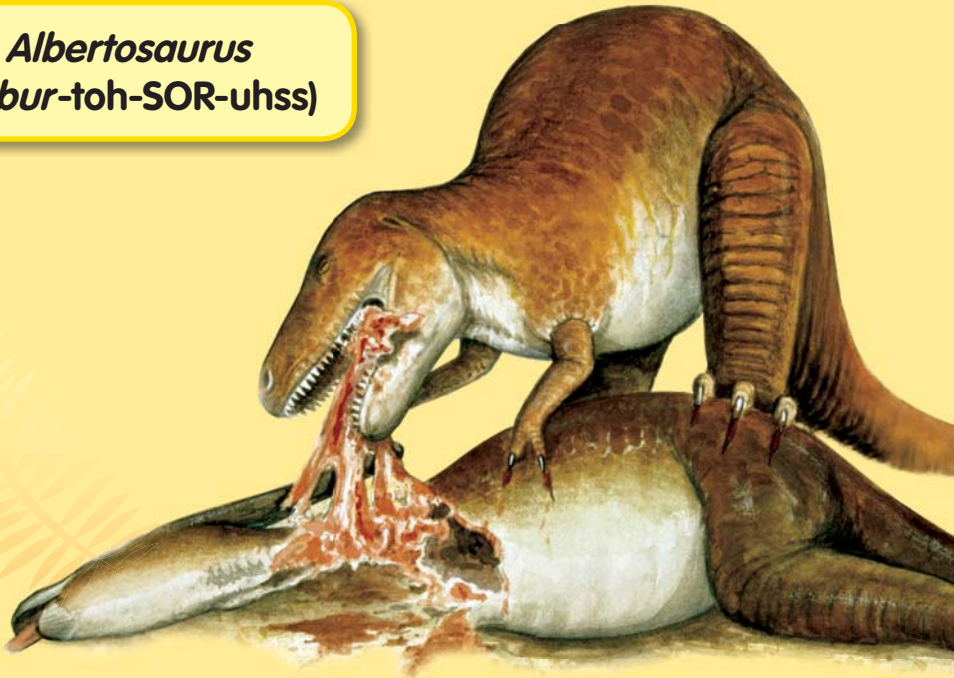
Segnosaurus
