# Spooky Spiders

Wolf **spiders** have hairy bodies.

Wolf spiders hunt alone. They may have gotten their name because people once thought they hunted in groups, like wolves.



## Many Kinds, Many Places

There are more than 2,000 kinds of wolf spiders.

These little creatures live in almost every part of the world.

They are found in both hot and cold places.

They make their homes in forests and deserts, and on beaches and mountains.

Wolf spiders are also found in people's homes and yards.









Some wolf spiders are as small as .2 inches (.5 cm) long. Others can be as big as 2 inches (5 cm).
