Ellesmere Island is located in the High Arctic—the northernmost part of the **Arctic region**. From mid-April through the end of August, the sun never sets in that part of the Arctic. From late October through mid-February, it never rises. Suddenly, Dean heard the sound again. Could it be a wolf howling? Then, about 30 minutes later, Dean and Dave saw something white moving toward them. "A wolf!" Dean shouted. Soon they noticed another one not too far behind. Dave and Dean sat very still. The wolves walked right up to them. It was exactly what the scientists were hoping for.




No Fear

In most other areas of the world, studying a wolf up close would have been very difficult. Wolves fear humans, who sometimes hunt and kill them for their fur. Other people kill them for **sport**. As a result, wolves don't usually let humans get very close to them.

The arctic wolf gets its name from the area where it lives.



Adult wolves have no natural **predators**. Only humans hunt wolves. However, the arctic wolves that Dave and Dean study live so far north that they don't see people often enough to be afraid of them. The nearest human community to the wolves is Eureka, a small weather station and military base located a few miles away. Only a handful of people live there year-round.
