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Swooping In

The dark early morning of May 2, 2011, was a quiet time in Abbottabad (uh-BOT-uh-*bod*), a small, pleasant city in northern Pakistan. Then, shortly after midnight, two helicopters moved in and swooped down on a house in a tree-lined neighborhood. This home was not like the others. It was larger and had a small separate guesthouse. Both of these buildings were mostly hidden behind a set of high maze-like walls.

The house in Abbottabad was about eight times larger than those in the rest of the city. As each helicopter reached the ground, a group of American fighters spilled out. Soon, loud blasts filled the air. The **commandos**—all members of a group known as the Navy SEALs—blew apart walls and doors as they shot their way into the **compound**. Moments later, they entered the main house. Once inside, the SEALs were closer than ever to carrying out their mission—to hunt down the world's most wanted **terrorist**, Osama bin Laden.



One of the helicopters—an MH-60 Black Hawk like the one shown here—crashed as it tried to land. Luckily, the SEALs inside were not harmed and continued on with their mission.

"SEAL" stands for sea, air, and land. Navy SEALs are sailors who are trained to carry out missions in all these environments.




This map shows the location of Abbottabad, the city where the SEALs' raid took place.



September 11, 2001

How had Osama bin Laden become the world's most wanted terrorist? On the morning of September 11, 2001, at 8:46, an airplane carrying 92 people flew into one of the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York City. Then, at 9:03 A.M., another airplane, this one carrying 65 people, flew into the other tower.

Fuel from the planes caught fire after the crashes, causing the twin towers to burn and then collapse. By 10:30 A.M., both towers had burst into flames and collapsed. By the end of the day, military and law enforcement officials had learned that the two planes had been **hijacked** by terrorists as part of an attack on the United States. The terrorists were members of a group called **Al Qaeda**, which was led by a man named Osama bin Laden.



Two other planes were also hijacked by Al Qaeda terrorists on September 11, 2001. The hijackers crashed one of the planes into the Pentagon (shown above) in Washington, D.C., killing 184 people. The other plane crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Forty people were killed.
