


Wolf Watching

The pack is led by a male and a female, called the **alpha wolves**.

They are the mother and father of the other pack members.

This evening we watched and listened as the wolf pack howled together.

My mom said the wolves were telling each other, "It's time to go hunting!"

Scientists think wolves howl for many reasons. One reason is to let other pack members know where they are. Another reason is to warn other packs to stay out of their **territory**.


