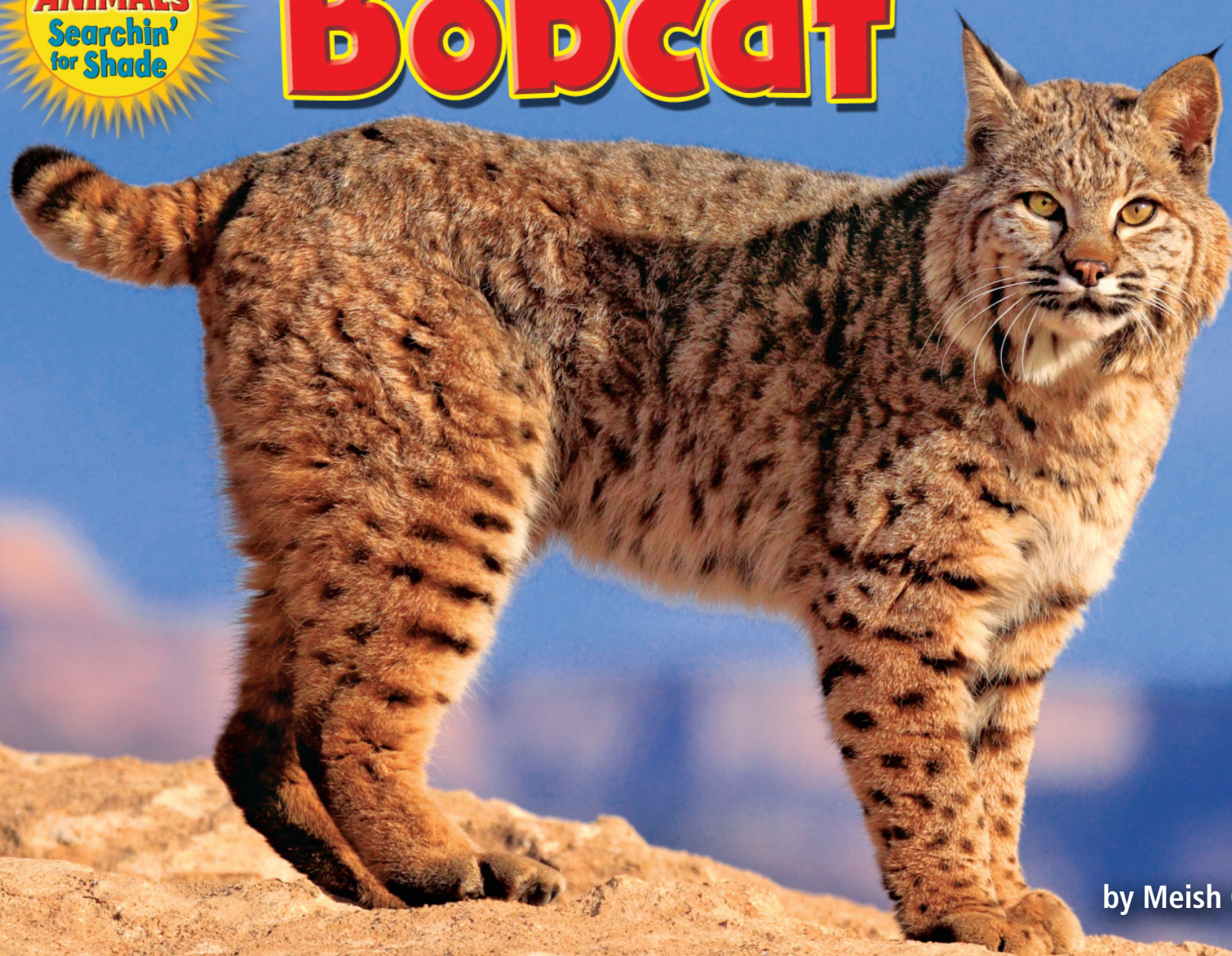

Then it will hunt for a meal in the cool, dark night.

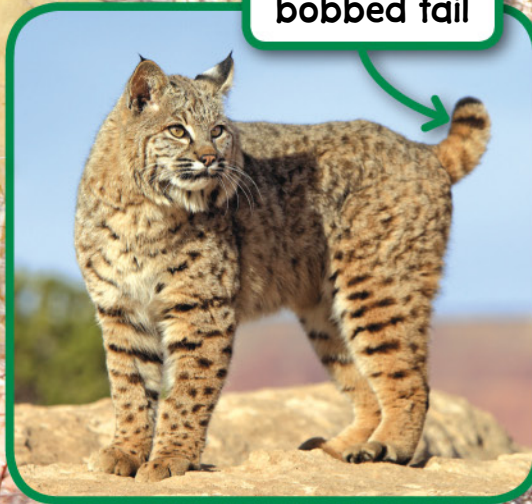

# Staying Cool

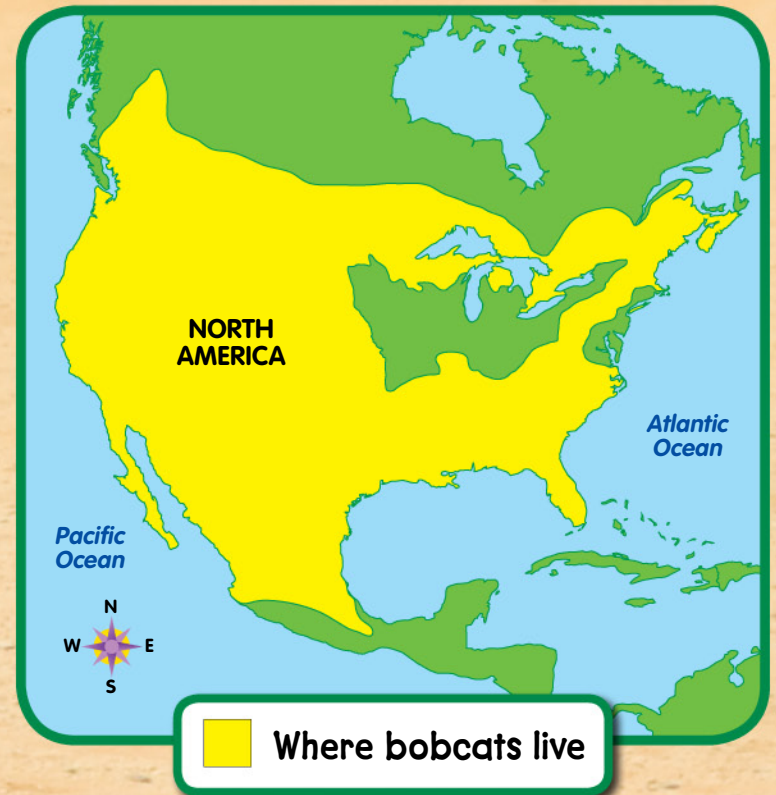
Bobcats are found only in North America.

Besides deserts, they also live in forests and swamps and on mountains.

In the desert, temperatures can rise to more than 120°F (49°C).


During the hottest part of the day, bobcats find shady places to rest.

They stay cool inside **hollow** logs, under bushes, or in caves.
