healthy. As president, he worked to make the


country stronger.

Cetting Over an Illness


Theodore Roosevelt was born in 1858 in New York. As a child, he had very bad **asthma**. Sometimes he even had to go to the hospital.

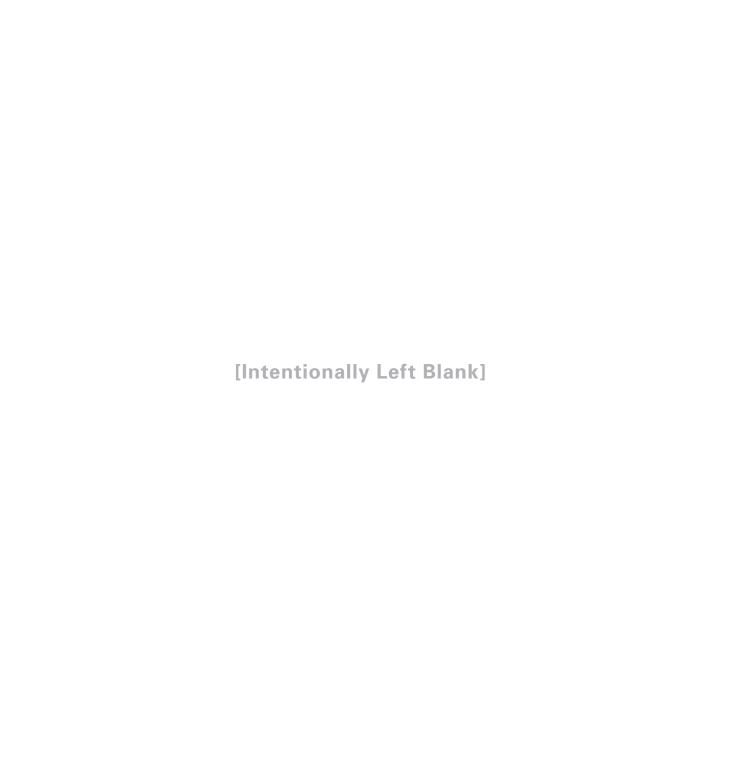


