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

## Watch Out!

Millions of animals swim in the ocean searching for food.

All around them, the dark blue water moves quietly.

Below them, however, something is hiding.

It is a tiger shark, looking for its next meal.

Tiger sharks have dark blue or gray backs, which act as **camouflage**. This makes it hard for other animals to see the big fish swimming below them.



## Danger Above

The tiger shark's dark-colored back is not the only thing that helps it hide in the ocean.

Most tiger sharks also have a white or light-yellow belly.

Animals swimming under a shark may not see the large fish when they look up.

The shark's belly blends in with the waters near the ocean's **surface**, which are brightened by the sun.







The average male tiger shark is about 12 feet (3.7 m) long. Females can grow up to about 15 feet (4.6 m) long.
