



# Sweet 63

The ball was **snapped**. The Kansas City Chiefs' quarterback, Damon Huard, dropped back to pass. He looked into the **end zone** and saw **tight end** Tony Gonzalez racing into the corner. Tony slid behind the Cincinnati Bengals' **defenders**. Damon let the ball fly. Tony reached out and pulled it down. Touchdown!

Now it was time to celebrate! Gonzalez took the ball and slam-dunked it over the cross bar. This was no ordinary score. It was the 63rd touchdown catch of Tony's career, a new NFL record for tight ends.




# **Building Self-Esteem**

Surprisingly, the great NFL tight end didn't start out as a natural at football. "I was awful as a child," Tony said. He remembers being one of the very worst players on his **Pop Warner** team.

It wasn't just a matter of skill. Tony was shy and he wasn't very aggressive. He was also afraid of some of the other kids. Up until middle school, he spent lots of time hiding from bullies.

What changed things around for Tony? Confidence! During the summer after eighth grade, he joined a basketball league and discovered that he was good at the sport. Basketball helped his **self-esteem** grow.
