


Struggles at Jamestown

It was late 1609, and Jamestown **Colony** in Virginia was about to collapse. The water was making settlers sick. The harsh winter was starving them. They were eating their pets and even their shoe leather. And local Algonquian tribes were threatening to attack. The colonists were preparing to quit and go back to England when, in the spring of 1610, more English ships arrived with supplies and additional settlers. Jamestown was saved!

The 13 Colonies

The first Europeans to settle in North America came for a number of reasons. Some were seeking wealth or treasure. Others were trying to claim more land for their home countries. And some were hoping to build a new life where they would be free to practice their religion. Over time, 13 colonies were established along the east coast of what would become the United States.

A colony is an area of land that has been settled by people from another country and is ruled by that country. The 13 original colonies are divided into three groups: The New England colonies, the middle colonies, and the southern colonies.
